The money raised will go to help with expenses incurred during the dry summer and purchase needed equipment and supplies. Clay Zimbelman, volunteer fireman, said that because of the recent wear and tear on the equipment, they have had to buy additional nozzles and a hose.

Equipment used by firemen, he said, is extremely expensive because it has to meet certain regulations.

Tax rebate program explained

Cheyenne County recently tax rebate for commercial or resiadopted the Neighborhood Revitalization Program, which is available to all property owners, including residential, commercial, industrial, and farm for all of Cheyenne County.

During the 1994 legislative sessions, lawmakers passed Senate Bill 3732, which provides tax rebates for new construction and the rehabilitation and/or addition of existing structures. In order to implement the legislation locally, each municipality must adopt a plan and designate an area in which they want to promote revitalization and development or redevelopment.

The program will provide incentives for building improvements through property tax refunds, and does not interfere with current property tax revenues. The program creates new long-term tax revenue, without creating a fiscal burden for the cities, school districts and county. It offers incentives for development where development might not otherwise occur. It helps create jobs because, historically, jobs follow development. Local businesses will benefit from construction material purchases. The Neighborhood Revitalization/Tax Rebate Plan will help reverse the outward migration of residents and the resulting deterioration of neighborhoods within the county. It will help stabilize land value and strengthen the fiscal capacity of our city and county governments to grow and serve our area. It provides a limited window of opportunity for participation (3 years), thereby, ment in the county

There must be a minimum in-

dential construction. New as well as existing improvements must conform with all codes, rules and regulations in effect. You must secure a building permit for all improvements, if applicable. The tax rebate will be based on the increase in assessed value following the first full year of completion. New construction, additions and major rehabilitations will increase the assessed value. Repairs generally will not increase the assessed value unless there are several major repairs or improvements completed at the same time.

Prior to beginning construction (not after construction has started), the property owner may apply for the Neighborhood Revitalization/ Tax Rebate Program, by obtaining an application from the county appraiser, or the city offices. The application must be submitted to the Cheyenne County Appraiser along with a \$50 non-refundable fee. Once the project is approved by the county appraiser, construction may begin. Prior to submitting the application, property owner's may want to discuss the proposed project with the appraiser, to check and see if the project will qualify for the program.

Under the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan legislation, the taxes relating to the assessed value on the property prior to the improvement may not be reduced and will continue to be payable.

Property owner's may apply each year that they make a qualifying improvement to the property even though the improvements may not actually be completed prompting immediate response, during the year. rebate is received.

Tax rebates will be received over a 10-year period on a sliding scale. The first year 100% of the taxes on the improved property will be rebated. The second year 90 percent of the taxes will be rebated and so on throughout the tenth year at which time 10 percent of the taxes will be rebated. In year 11 and on, no taxes will be rebated.

The total taxes rebated over the 10 years may decrease only if the assessed value of the property decreases. However, if the assessed

value of your property increases during the 10 years, your rebate will not increase. In other words, the rebate paid in any given year (1-10) will be based on the lesser of the increase in assessed value from the first year or the value assessed in the current year.

In order to receive the tax rebate, all taxes due must be paid in full, including taxes owed on all properties of the owner. Should a property owner fail to pay the taxes owed, participation in the program will be forfeited for the remaining term.

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
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
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
