## **Primary election** scheduled Aug. 7

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The Cheyenne County Primary will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 7, at the United Methodist Church in St. Francis and Immanuel United Methodist Church in Bird City. Election time is from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Remember, said Terry Miller, election officer, to bring some form of identification when coming to vote.

At the state level, incumbent Ward Cassidy, St. Francis, is running against Richard Billinger, Goodland, as representative of the 120th district. Incumbent Ralph Ostmeyer, Grinnell, is running against John Miller, Norton, for state senator of the 40th district.

Cheyenne County has two contested races in the primary. Three people are running for the position of register of deeds: Shelley Culwell, Jeanne Dunn and Melissa Tabor, all from St. Francis. For commissioner in District 3, there are two people running: incumbant Andy Beikman and Brett Poling, both of St. Francis.

Those running for clerk (Terry Miller), treasurer (Dolores Jenik), sheriff (Cody Beeson), county attorney (Karan Thadani), District Magistrate Judge District 1 (Robert Van Allen) and District Court Judge District 15, Division 2 (Scott Showalter) are running uncontested in the primary election. The seat for commissioner of District 2 is also up for election but Dale Patton, who is presently filling that seat, is running as an Independent.

There are rumors that there will be additional races in the general election in November but, there are no official candidates at this

American Implement Inc., headquartered in Garden City, has announced the purchase of Goodland Greenline and the Greenline facilities in Goodland and Wheeler. American Implement has also announced the merger with Colby/

Oakley Implement. These actions have resulted in a business that has over 90 years of industry experience and produce knowledge, 10 contiguous loca-

tions and over 260 employees. There is a long history of the John Deere dealership in Cheyenne County. The dealership was originally operated by the St. Francis Equity, with the shop, parts and showroom located downtown where the feed store and fertilizer shop are now located. In the fall of 1973, Robert VanAllen obtained the dealership, built facilities and moved it to its present location at the intersection of U.S. 36 and K-27, in Wheeler. In the fall of 2005, VanAllen sold the dealership to Goodland Greenline, who has operated it until the acquisition by American Implement.

Tim Neitzel, location manager for dealership at Wheeler, said this move will benefit the customers.

"Our current employee group will remain intact," Mr. Neitzel said. "We will have access to 10 lots of new and used equipment, and have easy access to a larger number of in-stock parts.
