the childhood memories he shared included working and playing hard with his cousins under the supervision of his aunts and uncles.

After graduating from Yuma, Colo., Dan began his lifelong passion for the cattle industry. His journey started at the Winger Ranch where he had the opportunity to strengthen and grow lifelong friendships. Later, he had the opportunity to start his own ranching operation in Haigler, Neb.

When a new school teacher moved into Idalia, Colo., Dan met his future wife, Karen (Strasser) Jones who was fresh from Iowa with her pigtails and love of cows.

Their daughter Amanda Faith was born in the tiny Haigler house between the rigor of ranch life including ditch irrigation, checking cows and feeding pigs. One short year later the family relocated to Rose Hill, Iowa, to farm with Karen's family. Humidity, mud and grass were a big change for the family. Adam Eugene joined the family on a miserably, hot summer day.

The next year the family took on the challenge of feedlot life. Living in Johnson and Scott City, the family enjoyed the opportunity to share in the excitement of the feedlot. Dan was so proud of his family's involvement in Beef Empire Days

In 1989, the family became complete when Katherine Lyn made her dramatic entrance coming three months premature and weighing in at 2 pounds.

Next the family moved to Garden City where Dan managed the 40,000 head Brookover Feedyard. Exciting projects included the Hawaiian-Bred and Kansas-Fed program, winning Beef Empire Days carcass contest and feeding cattle for big name industry leaders including the Sam Walton Family, Bob Evans, T. Boone Pickens.

Moving back to St. Francis in 1998 was the opportunity Dan was looking forward to get back home. It gave his kids and wife the chance to re-connect with cousins and thrive in the development of a family Angus Ranch. Dan was proud to see his son Adam continue the dream by running Crooked Creek Angus. He also enjoyed telling people about Amanda's college and the Redlands Programs. Dan was excited about Katherine's prospects for the future and her plans to attend graduate school and earn her master's in library science. In the summer of 2012, he drove Karen to Iowa to see family and also visited Amanda and Jeremy in Oklahoma.

On Oct. 11, he suffered a heart attack doing what he loved. Dan was out chasing heifers and being a cowboy on his last day. Being buried in Wray was very important to Dan. He was always so proud of his eastern Colorado cowboy heritage and we thank you for being here when he made it home.

After high school she worked at the J.C. Penney store in St. Francis, and then later at the Cheyenne County State Bank. On Feb. 20, 1946, Ruth married Clarence Zimbelman, son of John and Christina (Hoerth) Zimbelman at the Salem Evangelical Church west of St. Francis. Because of Clarence's career with the U.S. Government, they made their home in a number of locations in Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado over the course of their 66 years of married life.
