Music program held on Sunday

Christmas music will once again fill the old white church standing majestically north of St. Francis.

Members of Salem Lutheran Church have been preparing for the eighth annual celebration of "Christmas in the Country" set for 5 p.m. on Saturday. The prelude will begin at 4:30 p.m. and will include recorder duets by Talley Morrow and Cornelia Paulsen in the chancel area and the Once Again Sound Band in the balcony.

The service will be made up of music and the Christmas Gospel read in English and German to honor the Germans from the Black Sea area of Russia who settled northwest of St. Francis in the late 1800s and established Salem in 1901. Favorite carols will be sung by the congregation in English and German.

Groups performing that night will include the 50-voice Community Christmas Chorus under the direction of Neala Carmichael and two United Methodist Church hand bell choirs directed by Jennifer Krien. Sarah Whitmore and Talley Morrow will play a flute duet with Lila Whitmore as accompanist.

Food and fellowship will follow the service in the church basement. A free-will offering will be received and given to local helping agencies. The public is invited to attend. Snow date is Monday,
