Managed Care Organizations (MCO's) - Amerigroup, based in Virginia Beach, Va.; Centene, based in St. Louis; and United Health Care, based in Minnetonka, Minn. Each is charged with building a statewide network of providers for the full range of Medicaid services.

Starting in 2013, each company will be assigned a proportional share of the Kansans in Medicaid, representative of different regions, age groups, and populations, including people with disabilities, the elderly, and low-income children. There is a three-year KanCare contract pe-

One way to measure the financial performance of a managed care organization is to determine how much of its revenue is used to pay for health care services. This is known as the health benefits expense ratio. Each of the three managed care organizations selected for KanCare contracts reported a health benefits expense ratio as part of its financial report to the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

These three companies' ratios range from 81 cents to 85 cents of every premium dollar going to pay for health services. The remainder is used for administrative costs and company profit. Kansas did not specify a specific ratio these companies must achieve during the KanCare three-year contract.

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
