Firemen get needed equipment

Last summer, rain seemed to avoid the county and it was dry. Consequently, there were nufires and the firemen spent hours away from their jobs, homes, and sometimes, their beds, fighting fires. The year has not ended and the firemen already had over

Their equipment and firefighting clothing suffered. This fall, George Harper, fire chief, placed a request, asking for \$23,350 to replace some of the equipment. The city of St. Francis gave \$7,783, the county gave \$7,783 and the fire department, with donations and money in their budget, was able to come up with the rest of the money.

Chief Harper said that some of the equipment was 12 to 13 years old and was worn out. There were some instances where the equipment had belonged to former firemen and really didn't fit

The equipment was ordered and in September, boxes of

equipment arrived. Now, Mr. Harper said, each of the firemen have new helmets and two pairs of gloves (one pair for extractions and one for grass for their vehicles.

work in this county, Mr. Harper said. When we ask for help, we get it. Last summer when it was so hot and firemen were needing water, sports drinks and snacks, within an hour of asking, there were cases and boxes of the needed supplies.






