Lady Cougars bite Lady Indians

The St. Francis Lady Indians recorded their highest point total of the season on Tuesday evening, Feb. 12, but lost to the Cheylin Lady Cougars in McDonald. The 59 points the Lady Indians put on the scoreboard was onepoint better than the Lady Indians scored in their win over Wichita County earlier in the season. St. Francis drained seven treys, but could not keep pace with the Lady Cougars due to haphazard ball handling. The Lady Indians committed numerous turnovers in the contest. Both teams were in the bonus early in both halves, but neither team really capitalized on the bonus situation. The difference in the contest was ball possession.
