This act would exclude from federal regulation any personal firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition manufactured commercially or privately and owned in Kansas. As long as any such firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition remained in Kansas, the bill would provide that it would not be subject to any federal law, regulation, or authority. Also, the bill would prevent any federal agent or contracted employee, any state employee, or any local authority from enforcing any federal regulation or law governing a personal firearm, firearm accessory or ammunition manufactured and owned in Kansas, provided it remained within the borders of Kansas.

This bill essentially reaffirms the 2nd Amendment, which guarantee the right of Kansans to keep




