Prosecutors are deciding whether to pursue the death penalty in the case of James Holmes, who is accused of 166 counts of murder and attempted murder in last year's theater shooting in Aurora.

The state has executed just one person (in 1997), and there are three people sitting on death row now, but it remains an option.

The death penalty is something that should never be imposed lightly. It is the extreme and final measure of punishment available under the law, and should only be enacted in the most extreme of cases and should be carefully considered in every case.


