Commissioners discuss airport

karen.k@nwkansas.com Ongoing improvements at the Chevenne County Airport were discussed when the commissioners met on Wednesday, May 15.

Dave Yost, president of the Airport Commission, and Ron Loudboard member, talked about problems at the airport. The meeting was mostly just to inform the commissioners.

They said last summer's heat had taken a toll on some of the asphalt at the airport and the cracks will need to be filled. They said the commission had received money from the state to make those repairs.

The airport has been getting 95-5 matching grants and the wider, longer concrete runway was completed last year. There are two more major projects to be completed in the future including the taxiway and the "apron" for visiting planes.

The Federal Aviation Administration, Mr. Yost said, requires that the taxiway comes out at a 90-degree angle. This project will also be poured out of concrete. The county's share is estimated to be \$58.000.

At this time, the state doesn't have it's share of the money and the asphalt taxiway is still usable, he said. We will send out the bids to replace the taxiway toward the end of the year. He also noted that the 95-5 matching grants are no longer available but the county is eligible for

a 90-10 matching grant.

They said plans for the construction of the apron has been set for 2016 and will cost around \$40,000. The county has already invested a lot of money in the airport, Mr. Yost said. We are trying to maintain it. We want it to continue to be a well-maintained, good airport, he said. We just want to make sure the money to complete the projects is available. Brett Poling, commissioner, asked if both projects were done at one time, would it be less expensive? Mr. Yost said it probably would but the state doesn't have its share of the money available.

Mr. Yost reminded the commissioners that in the future, a tractor and snow removal equipment would be needed. We also have




