Mrs. Cook was born on Feb. 19, 1923, near Haigler but she was raised in Cheyenne County. in the county.

Luella. Elsie was the oldest. She grew up on the farm northwest of St. Francis. Her sisters, Irene and Bernice, are still living there, she said.

She attended West country school which was a quarter of a mile away and they generally walked to school. She well remembers during the 1930s when the dirt blew so bad that it was black outside. We had to stay at the school all night, she said.

In 1971, after 25 years of marriage, Curtis died. She then married John Cook in 1975. Both husbands served their country in the military. She also had a sister, son and grandson serve.
