The state health department said that because it cannot predict how long the federal shutdown will last, it can fund purchases made with October checks, but it cannot guarantee it can back grocery purchases made with November and December checks.

Football schedule for 2014 given at school board meeting

The Saint Francis Board of Education accepted two more gift offers when they met on Thursday.

Bill Ehrman representing the amusement authority presented a check to the board for \$200, thanking the board for the volunteers this year. The football players and coaches helped set up and tear down fair rides.

Additionally, Myra Douthit gave a gift of \$1,875, making the total gift from Roger Douthit's memorial fund \$6,000. The Roger Douthit Memorial fund donations were requested to be used in the ag de-

Staff salary

Mr. Schiltz said that there are still concerns about revenue being down for the state. It is unknown what, if any, budget cuts may come

However, he said, the real numbers came out better than expected for the school's budget. The school is \$30,000 ahead of what was anticipated.

With school finance in Kansas still quite uncertain, Mr. Schiltz said he was hesitant to recommend any increase in salary at this time. However, he is hoping at the end of the year that instead of a one-time adjustment, he can recommend to adjust the salary schedule.

The board discussed the salary adjustment. It was decided that they will postpone salary increases at this time, and reconsider the staff's salary toward the end of the fiscal

Health insurance

The school's health insurance plan year begins Nov. 1. Mr. Schiltz recommended that the board vote to increase the amount the school pays toward a single plan from \$380 per month to \$410 per month., and to increase the amount the school pays for each other "tier" from \$760 per month to \$820 per month. This would also ensure that the school is grandfathered in to any upcoming healthcare legisla-

The increase would cost the school \$14,040 annually. This increase will be paid from the contingency reserve fund this fiscal year, and, if possible, will be folded into the school's regular funding next fiscal year.

The board agreed with the idea of continuing to help with health insurance costs for school employees. After discussion, it was decided the school would pay the additional amount.

Football Schedule

St. Francis is considered to be a Class 1A school, with an enrollment of 84 in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12. Next year, the school will be considered an eight-man division 1 class for football. There are 50 schools with this classification of students numbering 63-91.

The goal was to stop classes Oct. 24, Stockton at St. Francis; from beginning fundraising at a low grade for unknown things. He said that both he and Mr. Morrow are not in favor of very long senior trips. Raising too much money for class trips, and other activities. could potentially cause problems.

Some parents were confused as to whether they could still raise money for sanctioned school programs and activities. It is only nonschool activities that are no longer allowed at school events or on school grounds. Any fund raising activity that takes place on school grounds must be approved by the administration.


