holiday, with ghost, goblins, witches and zombies out roaming the neighborhoods. But the holiday is also scary for other reasons.

With potential dangers such as pedestrian accidents, falls, burns, and poisonings, families should keep safety at the forefront of their mind this Halloween to ensure the holiday is a safe one.

According to Safe Kids Kansas, on average, children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a vehicle and killed on Halloween than on any other day of the year. Drivers should stay extra alert for more children on the streets and sidewalks. Children are focused on gathering candy and the excitement of the holiday rather than being careful while crossing streets.

"Kids need safety instruction before they go out trick-or-treating," says Cherie Sage, State Director for Safe Kids Kansas. "Many kids will be out trick-or-treating while it is dark when it is more difficult for drivers to see them. There are several easy and effective rules that parents can share with kids to help reduce their risk of injury. For example, children younger than age 12 should not be alone crossing streets on Halloween without an adult. If older kids are mature enough to go trick-ortreating without adult supervision, parents should make sure they go in a group and stick to a planned route with good lighting.

Even though it's a good idea for children to have a cell phone with them in case of an emergency, remind them to pay attention to their surroundings, and not be distracted from hazards because they are texting or talking on the phone.

While pedestrian safety is a main concern on Halloween, parents and kids should also be careful when dealing with candy.

"While kids never want to wait to dive into their candy, it is best to check sweets for signs of tampering before children are allowed
