County Commissioners meet By Karen Krien

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At the Oct. 31 the Cheyenne County Commissioners meeting, the commissioners met with a group of people representing the hospital and hospital board. One of the main things to come out of the meeting was the fact that the commissioners wanted to meet with a representative each month.

At the Nov. 15 meeting, Kari Gilliland, hospital board member, and Heidi Tice, chief financial officer, were there. However, they were unsure exactly what information the commissioners were wanting.

We don't understand your budget, Dale Patton, commissioner, told the hospital representatives.

The difference is, the hospital operates on an accrued base - not cash, Mrs. Tice said. When we see the revenue each month, it isn't the cash amount. If the hospital takes in more

money (if we make money), it has to be paid back (Medicare, Medicaid), Mrs. Gilliland said. In 2010, we had a huge receiv-

able that we had to pay back to Medicare, she said. It is a guessing We need communication and ed-

ucation, Mr. Patton said. When you don't get paid from Medicaid for three months, it is a lot of money on the books that is carried by the hospital. I have lived my life on a cash basis – never on accrued.

What I have heard, said Brett Poling, commissioner, is from my patients – that you want to cut staff. I want you to know that, as commissioners, we do not want anything cut. What we want to know, is there a reason you can't take money out of funded depreciation to subsidize the cuts.

Funded depreciation is the tice to see if the team can be board's decision, Mrs. Tice said.

Back to the information wanted by the commissioners, Mrs. Gilliland said a guideline for what they wanted was needed. You get the hospital board packet with the information in it. What other questions do we need to answer?

Terry Rieger and Vanessa Feldman, representing 911 dispatch, reported that the equipment in dispatch was bought in 2008 and needs to be updated. The company which has carried the maintenance agreement said that, as of Oct. 14, 2014, they will no longer support the syscenters that are in the same boat as Cheyenne County, Mr. Rieger said.

Mr. Rieger had contacted the Kansas State Adjutant General, who had advised the county, if possible, to wait to purchase the equipment, as the criteria for the needed equipment has not yet been set.
