Acreage report due By Angie Bock

Farm Service Agency Director Cheyenne County farmers who want to receive farm program payments from the U.S. Department of Agriculture are required by the 2002 Farm Bill to file acreage reports for all cropland on the farm as a condition of receiving program payments beginning this year.

Angie Bock, county executive director for the County Farm Service Agency, said producers have until Aug. 1 to file their final acreage re-

"Under the old farm bill, producers had to report crop acres only for contract commodities for which they wanted a payment and for fruits and vegetables. The new law required them to report all cropland acreage, which may include converted pasture and hayland." Director Bock said.

The requirement to report all cropland on the farm is a condition for receiving direct payments, counter-cyclical payments, loan deficiency payments and marketing assistance loans beginning with the 2002 crop year.

"Late-filed acreage reports will be accepted for crops where the reporting deadline has already passed," Director Bock said. "But late-filed fees will be applied. Late-filed acreage reports filed only to determine bases for direct and counter-cyclical payments will not be charged a late-filed fee."

Producers who earlier this year filed acreage reports for contact commodities only will have to re-file reports to include all cropland.

"We regret the inconvenience this will cause producer who've already filed a report," Director Bock said.


