Henderson, 5-7, is one of two seniors on the Kansas Wesleyan Lady Coyote basketball team. There are only four players returning from last year's squad including senior guard Henderson. Coach Cari Wilson has recruited a number of freshmen and junior college transfers to join the returning players. The team finished the

season 3-26 last year.

Henderson, a graduate of St. Francis Community High School and a former Lady Indian basketball player, was the team's leading scorer last season with a 9.8 average. She also averaged 3.0 rebounds and shot 74.5 percent from the free-throw line. In an article by Bob Davidson featuring Wesleyan basketball in the Sunday *Salina Journal* he states that Henderson, who has played for the program for four years, "still maintains a positive outlook."

"I have to keep myself and everyone else up, too. It's been a tough road but it is getting easier," she is quoted as saying.

Famous orchestra may come to town if arrangements are made

The members of the St. Francis Area Chamber of Commerce spent considerable time discussing how, when and if it would be feasible to bring the Glen Miller Orchestra to St. Francis in the spring or early summer.

Chamber secretary, Paige Gardner had been contacted that the big band would have openings in April and June and, while it would be exciting to have this quality of music come to St. Francis, members pointed out that it might be hard to find a suitable place which would hold enough people to meet expenses.

Robert Grace, member, said, in doing his math, he figured it would take 300 people attending at \$20 each to even come out on expenses. There is also the fact that only the older population would probably be interested in attending. This would suggest that advertising in the area would be needed and that would cost money.

Having a dinner before the concert was suggested, and, again, it was noted that an appropriate place to serve it would be needed and it would push the price up even further.

A committee was appointed to work out the details and the Glen Miller Orchestra will be discussed at a later meeting.

Signs

The Sign Committee had met prior to the meeting and had decided to go with a vinyl-type covered sign for the two signs advertising St. Francis, each about 6 miles from the city. The cost for the two signs will be approximately \$3,000 if Chamber members help put up the metal around the sign. Unfortunately, the Chamber has little money set aside for the refurbishing of the signs.

To help make people more aware of the signs, a Sign Design contest will be held. Kids and adults are urged to design and submit a drawing (computer or hand-drawn) and the committee will decide on the design at the end of the contest on Jan. 30. There will be \$100 in scrip money awarded to the winner.

The other sign needing refurbished is the sign at the road leading to the airport and the Good Samaritan Village. Organization members had suggested that there be a place where certain activities could be advertised and this sign was better located for this type of message. Earlier, it had been suggested that these activities be placed on the big road signs but the committee decided that they would detract from the sign and that signs should have no more than seven words — that is the most that people will be able to read while traveling down the road at 65 miles per hour.

The committee suggested that a drawing be held during the Christmas season with the drawing being held at the Christmas celebration on Dec. 15. However, no decisions were made and the committee will be meeting again in the near future to make more plans.

Spooktacular

The Spooktacular Committee reported that the day, held Oct. 26, had been fairly well attended with 25 or more entering the Spook Parade and the bike/trike rodeo. Super Foods and the Theater Committee had provided prizes of pop, candy and theater tickets.

Christmas

The Christmas Committee will be meeting in the very near future as the season is just around the corner. It was suggested that some other type of activity replace the Treasure Hunt which generally starts on the Friday following Thanksgiving and runs throughout the Christmas season. It was felt that moving Santa from business to business worked out well last year.

More people are needed to serve on the Christmas Committee and anyone having suggestions should talk to Chamber president Shawna Blanka, Secretary Gardner or one of the members of the Christmas Committee.
