



# Greenhouse has large variety of poinsettias

Tables after tables after tables are filled with red, pink and white poinsettias at Goodell Greenhouse and Floral, 219 W. Whittier, St., St. Francis. Many have already been sold but there are still plenty for the holiday season which began at Thanksgiving and will run through Christmas.

Much of the year, Mike and Shirley Marino and their son Michael are growing crops for the spring and summer planting but about the middle of August, they began thinking about the Christmas season. About that time, they receive a shipment of poinsettia cuttings — about 1,200 of them.

They arrive in flats and the Marinos and staff plant them in "rubber dirt," which resembles an oasis in which fresh cut flowers are put in arrange-

ments. As the plants grow, they are transplanted to containers. Container sizes vary and some are larger than others. This determines the size of the plant as it grows. Some containers have only one plant while others may have two, three or four and the larger the size of container, the more beautiful they are.

Mr. Marino reported that the color of the poinsettia is actually the leaves (braces) of the plant. The flower is the small buttons in the center which are yellow when open. However, it is the brilliant color of the leaves which makes this plant so popular during the holidays.

He said that years ago, there was only one type of poinsettia but today, there are hundreds ranging from red to pink to white to variegated. Besides

the typical poinsettias, the Marinos also have a "rose" poinsettia which has bright, curled leaves and gives the look of rose.

Poinsettias are more hardy that they appear. The Marinos keep the greenhouse temperatures at about 70 degrees at night and 80 degrees in the daytime. Mrs. Marino said that Mike uses special soil and feed which grows healthy, strong poinsettias. They will last longer and their leaves will not fall as quickly because of this special care.

About 50 percent of the poinsettias are sold at the greenhouse and the other 50 percent are sold at retail to area businesses.

The Marinos came to St. Francis 17 years ago. They had been in the greenhouse business for 29 years before

coming so they now have 46 years experience.

They had never raised poinsettias until their move to St. Francis but the need was there and the greenhouses were available. Before long, they had established a name and were raising and selling poinsettias along with many other spring and summer crops, trees and bushes.

"Poinsettias are a great crop," said Mrs. Marino.

In fact, figures show that more poinsettias are sold a year than any other flowering plant in the United States.

The Marinos still have lots of poinsettias and are ready for the Christmas season. They welcome visitors to see the many beautiful plants and will be glad to make a delivery to some special person for a holiday gift.

### “Something’s Missing”

The holiday season often renews feelings of grief related to the loss of a loved one. Television shows and commercials, magazines, and department store sales are just a few things that bring memories of sentimental occasions and touching family scenes. young family members in discussions and allow them a voice in the decisions that will one day become special events and memories for them.

quality of activities over quantity.

Family Traditions: children find security and comfort in knowing how the season will unfold: calling grandparents, using certain ornaments or decorations, preparing and serving special and traditional foods.

Include older children as a part of the planning process for the holiday season. That way, when time and money is limited, traditions are changed, and events rescheduled they

are aware of the reasons. As a result, whether the final decision is in their favor or not, they will be more likely to be understanding and involved because they had some say-so regarding the outcome.
