

Agency Office no later than Dec. 5. Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. A farmer is eligible to be a County Farm Service Agency Committee member if the farmer lives in Local Administrative Area (AL) Number 3 (located in the northwest 2/3 of Cheyenne County) and is an eligible voter. County Farm Service Agency Committee members may not hold positions in certain farm and commodity organizations, if these positions pose a conflict of interest with Farm Service Agency duties. These positions include functional offices such as presi-

The Chevenne County Farm Ser-dent, vice president, secretary, and positions on boards or executive committees. Additional in-Eligible voters have the right to formation on eligibility to hold nominate candidate(s) of their office may be obtained at the Cheyenne County Farm Service Agency Office.








The couple married on June 18, 1940 in Goodland, Kansas.

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
