# Runner in St. Francis

Christian McEvoy will be running through St. Francis on Wednesday on his way across the United States. He will be at the high school for lunch on Thursday and later, at 3:15, talk to the students during seminar.

He plans to be at the senior center for lunch on Friday. That evening, he will be a guest at the Methodist Church soup supper.

He is running approximately 3,500 miles, one step at a time, to raise awareness and money for cancer survivors.

M. McEvoy and the coast-to-coast run team need people's help, support and participation to successfully complete this challenging event. They plan to raise \$1 million on the run.

Mr. McEvoy started his run in San Francisco on July 1 and hopes to complete it at Narragansett, R.I., in December. High school challenge participants as well as

individual, college and corporate challenge participants can join Mr. McEvoy and run with him at various points along the route.

Cancer survivorship is the experience of living through, with and beyond the diagnosis of cancer. Currently, more than 10 million Americans are part of the survivor community.
