As a Thomas County Commissioner Glen became interested in economic development activities and is a member of the Thomas County Economic Development Alliance. The cost/benefit potential of incentive packages was illustrated by reviewing the numerous incentives Ellis County had offered Sykes Enterprises, and the economic activity their new business had generated for the Hays area. Glenn used this example to illustrate 'how business is done' in economic development these days.

When Thomas County and the City of Colby established their Economic Development Alliance, one of the first needs was additional residential housing. Thus, the Amber Waves project was an early activity, and more recently the Fairview Estates project has not

only provided a unique opportunity for older citizens but helped the housing situation for newcomers. The alliance has investigated and supported a variety of enterprises in the ensuing years. 21st Century Alliance, Sheleborne, Internet Kansas, US Premium Beef and McCarty dairy are familiar, but other projects such as strawboard manufacturing have not met with as much success.

One principle the county alliance has adhered to is to support all businesses in the county, not just startups. When aiding a new business they endeavor to avoid it becoming a direct competitor to an established county enterprise. This program has been associated with WKREDA, an economic development association for the western half of the state.

A current promotion is US83 as the North American Trade Corridor. This is an example of a long term project with great potential and relatively low involvement cost, but limited chances of total success.


Future prospects Include more dairy activity. Thomas County is bucking the area trend of contraction. Last year our county valuation increased over \$3 million. Thomas County with the City of Colby receives about \$100,000 a year in funds to operate, and currently businesses helped by the alliance pay \$200,000 in taxes.

Along with the increased patronage of other area businesses brought about by these new industries and their employees, it makes the efforts of Thomas County Economics Development Alliance look quite worthwhile.
