She then went to Denver to attend business college, planning to find employment in Colorado. W.D. Ferguson offered her a job as bookkeeper at the Thomas County National Bank. She accepted and this job turned into a lifelong occupation, advancing to teller, assistant cashier, and finally to vicepresident and trust officer. For a number of years she also served on the board of directors. She retired in 1979, after 37 years of service.




