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Relatives puzzled by mishap

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
The Goodland Daily News Kansas Bureau of Investigation agents are still trying to figure out why a 19-year-old Indiana man ran from a car accident in Colorado on Friday sparking a bizarre chase that ended with officers shooting the youth four times resulting in his death on I-70.

Bob Blecha, assistant director in charge of field investigation at the KBI, said three agents were in Sherman County this weekend and the investigation should be done by the end of the week. He said he couldn't release details, adding that the agents still had a few leads to follow up before the investigation is finished.

Blecha said the agents are looking into the background of Mark Christopher Palmer, trying to figure out why he acted so erratically and determining whether officers were right in shooting him. Meanwhile, Palmer's friends and family in his hometown of Carmel, Ind., are trying to cope with the young man's death and what went wrong.

Palmer's family was in Sherman County over the weekend to identify his body. A member of the family's church, who answered the phone at Palmer's father's home, said "he was a good kid." She said it's a hard time for the family.

"It's a very bad time and they are very preoccupied by things," she said, noting that church members are trying to help. There was an autopsy done in Topeka, but results aren't being released. Lt. John Eichkorn of the Kansas Highway Patrol said the results may be released after the investigation is done. Howard Hewitt, city editor at The Daily Ledger, the newspaper that serves Carmel, said the paper received an obituary today. It said Palmer was a member of the Grace Presbyterian Church of Indianapolis.
