



Dear Mr. Partier:

We all love the parties that take place during the holiday season but hate to deal with the trash. It is no doubt disheartening to look down the street and see the overflowing trashcans. So this year, consider some of these suggestions that will help you reduce waste:

• Wrapping paper. Instead of wrapwrapping paper that often cannot be recycled, use reusable gift bags. If you must buy Christmas wrap, look for gift-wrap that has recycled content. 
