

3 to 4 pounds of corned beef 4 large potatoes, peeled, and quartered 8 carrots, scraped and cut

into one-inch pieces 4 medium onions, peeled and


2 turnips, peeled and cut into cubes 2 tablespoons caraway seeds 1 medium sized head of cabbage, cleaned and cut into wedges

Place brisket in a large pot and cover with cold water. Bring to boil, reduce heat, cover pot with tight lid and simmer for 3 and 1/2 hours. Skim excess fat from liquid; add remaining ingredients except for cabbage. Bring again to a boil, reduce heat, replace cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Remove meat to platter, add cabbage to pot of vegetables and simmer uncovered, 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender. This dish will make eight servings.



4-Hers to show talent at club days

The Thomas County Club Days will be Friday, March 22, at the Sacred Heart School Building. Everyone is invited to come and watch the Thomas County 4-Hers perform their talents, said D'Ette Scholtz, Extension agent. A project talk is a talk about a 4-H projects. It can tell about experiences in the project and/or give information relating to the project. The time frame allowed for a project talk is up to seven minutes in length. 4-H'ers ages 7 to 9

and 10 to 13 are eligible to compete. A demonstration is showing and telling how to do something. It is a teaching method. Most demonstrations incorporate an introduction, a body which is the "show and tell" of the speech, and summary to stress important parts of the demonstration. Visual aids are recommended for giving a demonstration. The time frame allowed for a demonstration is up to 10 minutes for juniors and intermediate, and 15 minutes for seniors. 4-H'ers 7 to 9, 10 to 13, and 14 and up are eligible to compete.

An illustrated talk is a talk that tells how to do something by using pictures, charts, models, equipment and other types of visual aids. One need not demonstrate how to make something - they can tell about something instead. Visual aids are recommended. The time frame allowed for an illustrated talk is up to 10 minutes for junior and intermediate divisions, and 15 minutes for seniors. 4-H'ers 7 to 9,10 to 13, and 14 and up are eligible to compete.
