Potato Cakes (Latkes) 2 pounds potatoes, peeled and diced

1 large onion, peeled and diced Lois Myers

1 egg 3 tablespoons flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/2 teaspoon baking powder Canola oil for frying

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Place two cookie sheets in oven. Line large bowl with a clean kitchen towel. Grind potatoes and onion in food processor. (Do not puree.) Transfer to towel. Fold towel up around mixture, twist top, squeezing out all liquid into bowl. Pour off liquid in bowl, reserving potato starch. Add squeezed potato mixture to bowl. Mix in egg, flour, salt, pepper and baking powder. Heat 6 tablespoons oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Working in batches, drop heaping tablespoons of potato batter into hot oil. Using back of spoon, spread batter into 3-inch rounds. Cook until brown, turn over and brown other side. Drain on plate lined with paper towels, transfer to hot baking sheet in oven. Repeat adding more oil as needed. Serve hot. Makes 18 cakes.




