Mr. Harkins is survived by his wife, Jan, and daughter Sara Oliver of Lawrence; and one granddaughter. His daughter, Phoebe, preceded him in death.

Mr. Harkins was born and grew up in St. Francis. He attended local schools there and was a graduate of Kansas State University where he was a member of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity. As a veteran of the Naval Air Corps during World War II, he was a member of the American Legion and VFW.

Mr. Harkins was a prominent figure in western Kansas, Nebraska, and eastern Colorado when he was associated as a mortgage loan representative for Travelers Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., prior to acquiring the Thomas County National Bank from the late W.D. Ferguson. He also had a majority interest in the Citizens State Bank of St. Francis as well as ranching and farming interests in Cheyenne and Rawlins Counties.

Upon retirement from the bank in 992, he remained chairman and presi-

dent of the Thomas County Insurance Company before retiring as president the Dunne Gardner Oil Company of

Wichita. At one time, he owned the Colby Free Press and Prairie Drummer.

Among his memberships were the Lions Club, Isis Shrine of Salina, Colby Country Club, the Goodland Elks Club. the American Bankers Association, the Kansas Bankers Association where he served on several of its committees, the Kansas Service Thomas County Hospital, the Colby Chamber of Commerce and the Colby Economic Development Board.

Since coming to Colby in 1963 he not only believed in the Thomas County National Bank motto of "Community Builders," he professionally and personally actively supported community projects and activities, many of which were done anonymously.

He interests included flying, skiing and as a cattleman he was an accomplished horseman.

# Easter Egg hunt turns out well; eggs all found




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## **Historical Society plans dinner**

Kelsey Spresser had surgery in Denver on Thursday this week. The next Legion pinochle tournament will be April 13 at 7 p.m.


