# Students witness attempted theft in parking lot

A Rexford man could be charged with battery and felony theft after attempting to steal a pickup from the high school parking lot in Rexford on Thursday and then assaulting a Golden Plains High School student trying to stop him from taking it.

Anthony Endreola, 34, is currently in the Thomas County jail awaiting further evaluation as to his mental state with charges being recommended to Allan Taylor, Thomas County attorney, said Cloyde Hopper, investigator with the sheriff's department today.

The incident was reported to authorities at about 11:40 a.m. after students, who were taking a test in the gymnasium, happened to notice a man getting into a pickup they knew was owned by a fellow student, Hopper said.

As the student observed the activities outside, he noticed the man was hended.

Apparently, the student then turned to the owner of the pickup saying, "Hey, somebody is trying to steal your truck." In response, the student left the gymnasium and tried to stop the theft by leaning into the driver's side over the man to get the key from the ignition.

Endreola is alleged to have pushed the youth out of the way as he drove from the lot. Hopper said the young man was not injured.

Ken Patton, a deputy with the Thomas County Sheriff's office, was then dispatched to the scene when school officials called to report that a man had stolen a 1998 GMC Sierra pickup and assaulted a student.

After locating the pickup, Hopper said, Patton tried to take Endreola into custody, but he resisted. However, within minutes the man was appre-

## Colby woman enters guilty plea in child case

Free Press Editor A Colby woman entered into a plea negotiation earlier this month in Thomas County District Court for her involvement in two felony-level charges of indecent liberties with a young child under the age of 14.

Tonya S. Meyer, 25, pled guilty to attempted aggravated indecent liberties with a minor and aggravated indecent solicitation of a child on Wednesday, April 10, according to the journal entry filed on the case at the Thomas Schiffner, district judge, said the court County Courthouse.
