Colby Free Press Colby Police Chief Randy Jones, Sheriff Tom Jones, Undersheriff Mike Baughn and Mike Albers, the city's technology director, met with the Thomas County Commissioners at their Monday meeting to discuss equipment for the 911 system.

Albers said the present North Star system, which was purchased in 1988, is obsolete, and Southwestern Bell is no longer supporting it. He said there is a company that has remanufactured parts, but only has a two-year warrantee on the parts.

Albers said S&T Telephone will install a new key switch unit for approximately \$8,500-\$9,000. He said this is just for one part of the system. There may be other, unanticipated problems, he cautioned. Chief Jones suggested it be paid for with 911 funds.

Commission Chair Ron Evans said the county needs the 911 system and Commissioner Glen Kersenbrock agreed. "We want it. We're going to have to do it," Kersenbrock said.

The group also discussed a request for some new radios for Fire District No. 4, Rexford. Kersenbrock said Bill Dible of Rexford said they wanted to
