1/2 cup granulated sugar


Place peach halves in saucepan, add water and sugar. Bring to a simmer and cook peaches until tender, (about four minutes.) Drain, reserving liquid. Cool.


CAKE: 2 and 1/2 cups flour


2 teaspoons baking powder

non-stick cooking spray. Whisk together flour, baking powder and salt in large bowl. In another bowl, whisk together egg whites, sugar and oil. Stir 3/4 cup reserved peach cooking liquid into egg white mixture. Chop 4 of the peach halves into bite-size pieces. (Set aside the remaining peaches.) Stir the egg white mixture into the flour mixture until smooth. Fold in the chopped peaches. Pour the batter into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Bake in 350 degree oven for 35 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center of the cake, comes out clean. Let the cake cool completely in the pan on a wire rack

**TOPPING:** 

1 (12 oz.) tub whipped topping

Remaining peach halves

Chop the remaining peach halves into bite-size pieces, and fold them into the whipped topping. Spread whipped topping mixture over top of cake. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Makes 12 servings.
