County cautious on class

Colby Free Press A proposal to hold an emergency medical services training class in Colby raised more questions than it answered.

Kathi Wright, director of the Thomas County Emergency Medical Services and Gary Winter, a trainer from St. Francis, asked the Thomas County Commissioners at their Friday meeting for financial assistance to hold the training class in Colby.

The proposed class would be offered through Colby Community College and would be partially broadcast through I-TV to students in Goodland.

Depending on the number of students enrolled, the amount needed from Thomas County would be anywhere from \$1,600 to \$3,800, Wright said. Not all of the students would be from Thomas County. The commissions had questions and concerns over why this wasn't needed in the past, but is now.

Commissioner Glen Kersenbrock asked, "How did we get along all these years without it?"

Wright said that in the past the EMS training had been done in Hoxie. By moving the training to Colby, it would be more convenient and allow more students to participate.

Commissioners decided to table the discussion until Tuesday's meeting. At Tuesday's meeting, Kersenbrock

told Wright, "I don't think it is the responsibility of the county to pay the balance for tuition costs."

Wright said that the majority of the costs involved were not going to be used on tuition, but rather to buy training materials for the class.

Since training costs can be accounted for out of the EMS budget, Commissioner Ron Evans told Wright to get a list together with all the training materials that were going to be

More charges are pending in rooftop ruckus

Free Press Editor More charges are pending against a Goodland man who resisted arrest early last Saturday morning after a rooftop party complaint prompted authorities to investigate the situation at 145 E. 5th St. in Colby.

Isaiah Ray Sattler, 20, is now facing damage to property for his alleged role in damaging the slate tile roof of the apartment complex, said Gary Shull, Colby Police Department investigator. Those charges are in addition to battery on a law enforcement officer, obstructing official duty by resisting arrest, and criminal damage to property after he failed to stop when Colby police officers ordered him to do so, Shull said.

The new charges stem from a roof Thomas County District Court on inspection that was done following the Wednesday, Oct. 9, at 11 a.m.

confrontation. According to Shull, an inspector on Tuesday discovered damage to the roof that may be in excess of \$500 and related to the incident.

"As soon as the damage estimate is in, we will complete our reports and forward them to the Thomas County attorney," Shull said today.

The confrontation escalated after charges of trespassing and criminal Sattler ran from the scene after failing to stop in the apartment complex. He was later captured with the help of the K-9 unit nearly two hours later in the 300 block of N. Lincoln in Colby.

Sattler has a previous felony arrest in November of 2000, also in Thomas County for a violent crime committed against a person, he said.
