Eagles lose heartbreaker to Yuma, 24-25

In the end, all that was needed was a different score, as the Colby Eagles fell to the Yuma Indians 25-24 Friday night at Homecoming.

Yuma made it exciting right away, taking the opening kick-off all the way to the Eagle 33 yard line. They then proceeded to march straight into the end-zone and went up 7-0 with 9:21 left in the first quarter.

Colby marched right back, but a holding penalty stalled the drive, and they had to punt.

The Indians responded by taking the ball down to the Eagle four-yard line, but Colby stood tall at the line, and Yuma had to settle for a field-goal as the first quarter ended.

It was the last time Yuma would have its way in the game.


Ryan Arensdorf's 65-yard run set up a one-yard Cranston quarterback keeper on fourth down for Colby's first score of the game. The point-after kick missed, and the score was 10-6 Yuma.

The Eagle defense, led by senior Brent Deibert, got Colby the ball back with 7:02 left in the half. The Eagles got their first lead of the season after a 55yard touchdown reception by Arensdorf, and after the point-after failed, Colby was up 12-10.

Yuma was in the middle of putting another drive together, but then committed the only turnover of the game. Moments later, with 3:25 left in the half, Brian Sulzman made an impossible one-handed catch on a pass from Jared Cranston, and then eluded several Indian players and ran into the endzone for Colby's third touchdown of the second quarter. Unfortunately, Colby missed its third extra-point of the second quarter, but were up 18-10.

With 1:39 left in the half, Yuma's Caleb Melzlon scored his second touchdown of the game on a 51-yard run. The Indians converted a two-point extra, and the game was tied at 18. That was the score as the first half ended.


