## School numbers are down

Colby Free Press The Colby School District's final enrollment figures are in, and the head count is 19 fewer than last year.

If only it was that simple budget-

With F.T.E., or Full Time Enrollment, weighting, and factoring in enrollment figures from the Thomas County Learning Center, and shaking a Magic 8-Ball to see if Gov. Bill Graves will hit the schools one more time before he says farewell in January, the school district's business manager, Jo De Young, is ready to say, tentatively, that Colby might just come out slightly ahead of last year in the money

"We budgeted for a four percent decrease," she said this morning. "That's about what we had. But then you have to factor in the Thomas County Learning Center, where enrollment is up twenty-five students. That balances out our loss."

Sounds easy, so far.

But, with Kansas schools facing budget shortfalls, the state is doling out money in allotments.

"With the three-year averaging that we do," DeYoung said, "we should be around \$75,000 higher than last year. But the state is only going to give us \$50,000 of that. So that's a net gain of

"But," she added, "we may or may not get that, depending on what the governor decides to do before he leaves office. He may cut that, as well." De Young said that the district is do-

ing everything it can to be frugal. "We aren't spending any money that we don't have to until we know how things are going to shake out," she said. "We're meeting payroll and basic expenses, but after that, we're being very careful.

The final enrollment head count is officially 1.043, with 386 children enrolled at Colby Grade School, 269 students at Colby Middle School, and 388 at Colby High School.

Last year the total was 1,062 stu-

## Trucker being held in jail here

## He allegedly burglarized firm he works for

A Colby man remains jailed today after being arrested for allegedly burglarizing the trucking firm he works

The Colby Police Department received a call Wednesday afternoon from C.R. England Trucking Company, said Colby Police Department investigator Gary Shull.

The trucking company, according to Shull, told dispatch they had information to believe their truck, parked across the street from Colby Ag Center, was being high jacked.

Witnesses from Colby Ag Center had called the trucking firm to report

Shull said that when officers arrived at the West Fourth Street location no one was around the truck, but the other driver was asleep in the rig's sleeper. At this time, he is believed to not be

"The officers did find evidence that the seal had been broken on the back of the truck," said Shull.

After talking with witnesses and gathering evidence, the Colby man, whose name is not being released by the Police Department at this time, his daughter, and her 19-year-old friend were arrested.

Shull said the missing cargo was toys and candy and said Colby police feel like they have recovered most, but not all, of the stolen property.

The daughter was booked and released to her mother.

## West Nile reaches 87 counties in Kansas

tional map showing the 32 states with human cases of West Nile virus, Kansas stands out like an island of safety. So far, somehow, not a single person has been confirmed to have contracted the mosquito-borne disease.

But Kansas' horse population is suffering, and so are shaken owners like Bill Cummings, who watched his 1,200-pound quarter horse Colonel Bill sicken and succumb to West Nile in a matter of days.

"I know it was my mistake not having the horse vaccinated," said Cummings, of Garden City.

Like many people, however, he didn't think West Nile virus would spread as it has this summer. For one thing, while the public has been cautioned for months to eliminate pools of standing water where mosquitoes typically breed, much of Kansas has been dust-dry. "It doesn't have to be wet for this thing to hit. It's dry at our place; the river beds are dry," said Cummings,

whose family stables seven horses. On Wednesday, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment reported that West Nile virus has been confirmed in 16 more of the state's 105 counties, for a total of 87.

No part of the state is spared. Cases have now been confirmed from Sherman County in the far northwest to Doniphan County in the northeastern corner, from Morton County in southwestern Kansas to Cherokee County in the southeast.
