The National Association of Veterinary Technicians in America, Inc., has proclaimed Oct. 13-19 as National Veterinary Technician Week. The event is celebrated annually to recognize veterinary technicians nationwide for their contributions as members of the veterinary health care team.

National Veterinary Technician Week provides veterinary technicians the opportunity to promote their profession to the public and to colleagues. This year's theme, Veterinary Technicians—the heart of animal health care, focuses on the caring aspect of the veterinary technician's role.

Primary responsibilities in a veterinary practice involve animal nursing, administering medications, assisting in surgery, taking radiographs, inducing and monitoring of anesthesia, hospital management and laboratory duties. Veterinary technicians are also employed in biomedical research, military, sales, industry and education.

The National Association of Veterinary Technicians in America is a nonprofit organization that represents and promotes the profession of Veterinary Technology. The organization provides direction, education, support and coordination for its members, and works with other allied professional organizations for the competent care and humane treatment of animals.

The Colby Community College program is the only American Veterinary Medical Association accredited program in Kansas. Dr. Boyd Walker has been director of the program since 1977. He was joined by Dr. Cathy McMulkin in 1978. They are assisted by Registered Veterinary Technician

The field of veterinary technology began in earnest in the late 1960s. As veterinary medicine and animal health became more complex, the need arose for trained assistants who could take over the routine tasks of animal care and give veterinarians more time for clients and patients. Technicians perform their tasks under the supervision Priority date for applications is April of a veterinarian. They do not make diagnoses, perform surgery or prescribe medication.

Chapter representative from Goodland Roberta Bretz, as well as the newly hired chapter manager in Colby,




