Voters to see many changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Voters heading to the polls in 2004 will see new voting machines, provisional ballots and ID requirements under a bill Congress has sent to the White House. The Senate passed the bill 92-2 Wednesday, nearly a week after the

House approved it in a 357-48 vote. President Bush issued a statement saying the legislation contained "important election reforms" and promised to sign it.

The measure is the result of months of negotiation to craft a federal solution to the balloting problems in Florida that plagued the 2000 presidential election.

The election overhaul provides money for states to replace punch-card and lever voting systems with upgraded machines. It requires provisional voting, which allows people who claim eligibility to vote even when their names do not appear on election rolls. Those ballots would be set aside; election officials would determine later whether they were valid.

The startling disclosure, announced Wednesday night by the White House, changed the political landscape in East Asia, setting back hopes that North Korea was on the road to becoming a

Japan expressed "grave concern' about the North Korea's nuclear revelation.

Presidential spokesman Sean McCormack said North Korea was guilty of a serious infringement of a 1994 agreement with the United States under which Pyongyang promised to be nuclear-free in return for economic assistance.

North Korea disagreed.
