Salmon hit second homer of the game, a tiebreaking, two-run drive with two outs in the eighth inning that sent the Angels over the San Francisco Giants 11-10 Sunday night and evened the World Series at 1-1.

"We knew there was going to be a hero in the dugout," Salmon said, "and tonight it was me."

Barry Bonds homered for the second straight day, hitting a 485-foot shot. The solo homer came in the ninth off Troy Percival.

But like the rest of the Giants, Bonds couldn't get on base against Rodriguez as he grounded out.

Rodriguez pitched three perfect innings, relieving in the sixth inning when the Giants led 9-8. The 20-yearold sensation became the youngest pitcher to win a Series game. At 5-0, he tied Randy Johnson's record for wins in a postseason set last year.

"I never got nervous," he said after the longest outing of his big league career.

Salmon went 4-for-4 with a walk, driving in four runs and scoring three.

Until this year, no active player in the majors had gone longer than Salmon - 1,388 games — without reaching the postseason. But that wasn't a wellknown fact because Bonds has been the center of attention, especially since this

is his first Series. But Salmon put the spotlight squarely on himself on this night by homering to give the Angels their firstever World Series win.

"I think I made the most of my opportunities. It was awesome," Salmon said. "The way the game went backand-forth was unbelievable.'

Bonds, making his first Series appearance in his 17th major league season, went 1-for-2 with three walks.

Bonds had plenty of praise for Salmon, whose hit the go-ahead homer off Felix Rodriguez.

"It was too much Salmon," Bonds said. "It's phenomenal. He did everything any player could do in one game except steal home."

The Angels did that, too. Brad Fullmer sneaked home to cap Anaheim's big first inning against Russ Ortiz.

This was the highest-scoring game in the Series since Cleveland beat Florida 14-11 in 1997.
