Advance voters who have either requested a ballot by mail or walked-in to receive one, she said, totaled 366.

People who are using the advanced ballot method and are not sick or disabled, had until noon today to return the form to the county clerk's office. For those who are sick or disabled, Perkins said, they have the same time to return the ballot as those going to polling locations with the exception that advanced ballots must go directly to the clerk's office. The polls will open

at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Tuesday As for predicting voter turnout, Perkins said there are enough ballots for 80 percent of those registered, which should be more than enough.

There are seven polling locations for the 18 precincts in Thomas County, said Perkins.

For people in Barrett and East Hale Township, voters will go to the East Hale Township Hall with those from West Hale and Kingery Township in Brewster City Hall.

The Mingo Co-Op Office is designated for South Randall and Summers Township and voters in Lacy and North Randall will go to the Gem Community Building.

The National Guard Armory will serve as the polling location for East Morgan, West Morgan, and Rovohl Townships, along with Wards III and

Menlo, Smith and Wendell Township residents will be voting at Rexford City Hall and the Colby Community Building's north lobby will be open for Ward I with Ward II voters also casting their ballot in that building.
