Shane said, "There are very few people in this country who can not work and make a living. Many of them don't know they can because they have never been encouraged."

Shane said, "We live in a country that we do have caring people and we have the best technology that allows most people to live out their dreams."

"What has sustained me is the Lord

Jesus Christ. God made man in the image of himself...God doesn't make mistakes. I have always had a determined spirit, people need to know that they are loved and they are all right. There are some at the School for the blind that think of themselves as obligations to other people. My family gave me love, care, and opportunities to be all that I can be."

Shane doesn't read Braille, and ended his talk by saying he tried to get into the Marines, they said, "no" he tried to become a drivers education instructor the answer was no.
