Betty works very hard on everything she takes on. She has researched the history of the local country schools, which seem to have been quite numerous. Roger has shared about some of his experiences in the different country schools and it seems that they were mainly good fun and learning times, for those that attended, Being a "city

bellied stove pranks" that I've heard so many alumni of these one-roomed school houses talk about. At any rate, I've never heard any one that attended on these school say they weren't happy for the experiences of the "country schools."

Some of the schools that Betty mentioned in her historical stroll were: Prairie Gem, Garden Plains, Muldrow, Pleasant Home, New Hope, Fairview and Lone Star. The one that she highlighted for this go around is Union Valley. It was located approximately 2.5 miles south and one mile west of Brewster, in Sherman County. The school was started Jan. 5, 1887. Records are sketchy all the way through, but some of the names such as Alma, John, Lena and Anna Gardels; Dave, Kate Louie and Lucy Sonday; Ellen and John Fenno; Rex Jacobs and Zella Lem, Glen and Alvin Fulwider show up on the class roll. A few of the teachers were: Kittie McArthur, Jennie Shirley, Lizzie Ackerman, James Stirling and Clara May Harris.

In the "Union Valley Notes" copied from the Brewster Hustler on Jan. 15, 1909, Little Ruth Noe started school at Union Valley last Monday. Miss Anna King was teacher and attendance at the school was irregular owing to the severity of the weather. The thermometer registered -10 degrees, many days. In fact, the article continued, "Jan. 22,

girl," I missed out on the adventures in 1909, the roads were like glaciers in the the outhouses or witnessing the "pot-mornings, and lakes at evening. Louie Sonday and Chester Olive were able to attend the Spelling Match, on Friday

night of the week.' The article continued to Feb. 5, when several of the young folks attended Literary, at Brewster, the previous Friday night. John Gardels and his sister,

Miss Lena, spent Sunday night of that

week Pluma and Wyman Petty. On April 9, the school prepared a Literary program, for close of school term. Walter Strain visited the Sonday twins on Sunday, (he later married Lucy, one of the twins.)

May 7, 1909, Union Valley closed a very successful school. The program was a credit to both teacher and pupils. The graduates of Union Valley, in 1909 were Lena Gardels and Chester Oliver. Their graduation was held in the Goodland Opera House on July 1, 1909. Only June 16, 1909, Miss Anna King and Norman Brooks were married. They are the paternal grandparents of Collene Rall.

Thanks Betty for the reminiscence. Many names were forefathers and mothers of today's families and Betty has much information on the grandparents or great-grandparents. you know, our ancestors are neat people to learn about and to learn from. One of these days, we'll be the ancestors that our kids will hopefully want to know a little about. Hope we leave some good things, don't you?!? See you next time.
