Heat oven to 325 degrees. Spray a 13 x 9 inch pan with cooking spray. In large bowl combine oil and egg; beat well. Add bread mix, apple pie filling, and spices. Stir until mixture is just moistened. Stir in nuts. Spoon into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Bake 45-55 minutes or until cake is golden brown. Cool thirty minutes.

Meanwhile, in medium sized saucepan, combine sugars, margarine and cream. Bring to a boil, stirring and cooking until mixture reaches a full boil. Remove from heat; stir in vanilla.

Cut warm cake into squares and place on desert plates. Top each serving with warm sauce. (Add a dollop of whipped cream if desired.) Serves 12.




