Stovall says to watch for flood-damaged vehicles

Dear Attorney General Stovall:

I will soon be shopping for a used car. However, I have heard that flood-damaged cars are sometimes brought into the state to be sold after floods occur in other states. Attorney General Stovall, could you give me some guidelines as to what to look for when shopping so that I can avoid a flood-damaged car? Dear Kansas Consumer:

It is true that flood-damaged vehicles have been brought into Kansas following natural disasters in other states.

Flood-damaged cars will usually have a musty or sewage odor, or a strong scent of air fresheners that attempt to mask the odor. You should check for rust, sand, silt, mud or salt deposits under the spare tire and under the seats, check nooks and crannies for mud and sand, and be sure to check the oil dip stick for signs that water has gotten into the system and contaminated it.
