Dance Through Time here Sunday

Western Plains Arts Association officials are calling "Dancetime" a living, breathing, pulsating, time-travel of the San Francisco-based theatrical dance company, *Dance Through Time*.
The company will be appearing on Sunday at 3 p.m. (CST) in the Cultural Arts Center on the campus of Colby Community College.
Dance Through Time transports the audience on a fantasy journey through 500 years of dance punctuated with dialogue, song, and music of the times, said officials here.
"Dancetime" travels from the 15th Century to the 1990's and covers the globe from Italy, France, and England to America.
With nearly 500 authentic costumes to choose from, "Dancetime" is a full theatrical show of life seen through the eyes of dance.
Carol Teten is the founder of *Dance Through Time*, sources said.
As a noted dance historian with a contemporary vision, Teten used her research and personal collection of over 700 volumes of rare dance manuscripts, journals, books and film clips to create the company's repertoire of five full-act productions and over twenty-five one-act shows, association officials said.
She received her bachelor of arts in Dance from Sarah Lawrence College and her masters of arts in Dance from the University of California at Los Angeles.
Her film credits include a Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation in

which she choreographed dance sequences for the movie "Shadow of a Doubt," and featured dancers from *Dance Through Time*.
Admission at the door will be \$15 for adults and \$5 for students or by Western Plains Arts Association season passes.
Funding for this performance has been contributed by the City of Colby Special Law Enforcement Fund at the Thomas County Community Foundation, and also by the Thomas County Community Foundation Kansas Health Foundation fund.
This program is also presented in part by the Kansas Arts Commission, a state agency, and the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

Old Cowtown Museum receives 1870s log cabin

SALINA (AP) — A log cabin believed built in the 1870s has been moved from its home 16 miles southeast of Abilene to the Old Cowtown Museum in Wichita.
About \$148,000 will be spent to restore the cabin and get it ready to show to thousands of visitors yearly.
"We're hoping people all around Kansas will join us in our joy," said Jan McKay, executive director of the museum. "We hope people will join us in preserving this piece of the past."
Restoration will begin once more funding is secured, said McKay, who estimated another \$100,000 was needed along with the \$48,000 willed by Donna Heller, the Wichita resident who donated the cabin to the museum.
A group of Wichita State University graduate students is working on a research project on the late pioneer and his cabin, Scott said.
