

Trojans finish 3-3 in Arizona

Trojan baseball just completed an 18-hour journey from Prescott, Ariz. We left after our game Saturday afternoon and have spent a cozy evening in the Colby Community College bus. Nothing brings a team together like 36 hours on the road and five nights together on a bus and in a hotel.

Tuesday night at 7 p.m. and arrived in Prescott 18 hours later on Wednesday afternoon, primed and ready to play the local junior college power, Yavapai College on Thursday morning.



We took that goal into our 3 p.m. game on Thursday against New Mexico Military Institute. After two innings it was 4-0 Trojans and we seemed on our way to a quick game, but the Bronco's hung around and we only beat them 7-0.

Freshman lefty Tyler Landenberger from Lakewood, Colo. threw six innings of one hit ball to earn his first collegiate victory. Tyler had a no-hitter through five when with two men on (due to walks) the Bronco hitter bunted a ball on a low line drive in the direction of our young pitcher. Tyler dove forward in an attempt to catch the ball and double one of the runners off base. Unfortunately the ball hit the top of his glove and dropped in front of him for a base hit. Jayhawks make it to the Final Four

AP Basketball Writer No. 1 seed, one team back for a second straight year and two schools on Saturday, is in the Final Four for from the same conference for a fifth straight season.

Texas was the only top seed to make it through its bracket, beating Michigan State 85-76 Sunday to get the Longhorns in the Final Four for the first time since 1947.

Second-seeded Kansas eliminated Arizona, the other No. 1 seed, 78-75 on Saturday.

The presence of the Jayhawks, who lost in the national semifinals last season, makes it the fourth straight year a team has made consecutive appearances in the Final Four.

Syracuse, which beat top-seeded Oklahoma 63-47 Sunday to win the East Regional, is back in for the first time since 1996 and the third time under coach Jim Boeheim.

The third-seeded Orangemen's other appearance in New Orleans could never quite get our line drives ana on a jumper by Keith Smart in
