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Advanced ballots are now available

Advanced ballots can be picked up at the Thomas County Clerk's office, 300 N. Court in Colby for the Tuesday, April 1 election, said Tracey Perkins, county clerk.

Perkins said she isn't expecting a high voter turnout, which is typical when no questions or national candidates are on the ballots.

With 5,275 registered voters out of a little more than 8,000 potentials in the county, she said she hopes for about a 30 percent return.

For those wanting to use advanced ballots, Perkins encourages them to either stop by the office between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. or request an advance application up until Thursday to have one mailed.

Advance ballots must be returned to the clerk's office no later than noon on Monday before the election unless the voter is sick or disabled. In those instances, the voter has until the polls close at 7 p.m., Tues-

Candidates in the Colby School District are Stan Molstad, incumbent, along with three newcomers, Kevan T. Taylor, Joel Powell and Dewey Augustine.

Kansan captured by Iraqis

DERBY (AP) — The brother of a Kansas soldier held captive in Iraq said today he wants the United States to get the war over "as fast as possible" so his brother can come Pfc. Patrick Miller, 23, of the

Wichita area is among the five soldiers captured Sunday, his family Miller graduated from Valley

Center High School. He and his family had been living in Texas but his wife, Jessa, and their two children moved back to Park City to live with her mother when Miller was deployed in December. Valley Center and Park City are near Wichita. Miller and the other captured sol-

diers were thrust in front of an Iraqi TV microphone and peppered with questions Sunday. The footage also showed at least four bodies. The soldier's half-brother, Tho-

mas Hershberger, 27, of Derby, said his mother spoke to Miller's wife Sunday. She had received confirmation from the military that Miller was being held by the Iraqis. "She is not doing the best right
