Cormier wins championship; Blackmon places fifth

College wrestlers continue to excel United States' most elite division. Daniel Cormier and Ramico Blackmon each earned honors this weekend while competing in the United States Senior National Freestyle Championships in Las Vegas, Ne-

The Senior Nationals is the nation's premier open tournament and serves as a qualifying tournament for individuals hoping to earn a spot in the World Team or Olympic Trials.

Cormier earned the national championship in the 96-kilo (211.5 pounds) weight division after posting a 6-0 record. Cormier is currently the top ranked freestyle wrestler in the United States at his weight classification. He was expected to make a run at the title last season, but was unable to compete. He placed seventh in the event in 2001.

Cormier, a native of Louisiana, is the only two-time National Junior College Athletic Association national champion in the history of Colby Community College wres-

Following his success for Colby College he transferred to Oklahoma State University, where he earned runner-up honors in the 2001 National College Athletic Association national tournament.

Blackmon placed fifth in the 74kilo (163 pounds) division after posting a 6-2 record. After earning the 2001 Senior National championship at 67 kilos and placing third in the 2002 Senior Nationals, Blackmon had been considered by many within the sport to be a likely candidate for the 2004 Olympic

But Blackmon was dealt some bad luck when International Olympic Committee decided to eliminate and consolidate weight classes within the freestyle wrestling ranks. This decision forced him to bump up a weight division, which is a difficult task. But the task is made all the more difficult when one of the nation's most successful wrestlers, Joe Williams, competes in the new weight division.


