

Colby Eagle golfers place first in league

Colby Free Press The Colby Eagle golf team had a profitable day on Friday as they claimed the Northwest Kansas League title in Oberlin. The boys collectively shot 319, which was a record at the Oberlin Country Club for high school teams.

Coming in second behind Colby was Atwood with 324 strokes and Goodland with 329. Hoxie finished with 342, while Oberlin had 368, Quinter finished with 380 and Oakley had 377.

In addition to taking first place, several of the golfers medaled individually including a third place finish for Christopher Finley with 78, fourth for Deni Wieland with 79, and seventh for Jared Helin with 80. Sean Mengel tied for tenth place by shooting 82, but lost in the play-off to fin-

ish eleventh.

"I am very happy for this bunch of guys," said head coach Ray Higley. "They seem to be peaking at the right time."

This is the third win in a row for Eagle golf team who competed in the regional tournament today in Pratt. The Regional tournament will determine who will qualify for the State tournament at Buffalo Dunes in Garden City to be played May 26. The top two teams will qualify as well as the best five scores posted by players who are not a member of one of those two teams.

"We had our best performance of the year thus far at the League golf tournament," Higley said. "We are really hitting our stride at the right time going into the Regional tournament in Pratt."


