Kansas Senior Press Service For years my husband has been a steady, optimistic, cheerful guy. Now he's turned sort of morose and seems sad or blah most of the time. I can understand that we're living in hard times. Our retirement savings have taken a hit, of course, and there's the war with its uncertainty. But we've lived through hard financial times and several wars now. There have been about six months of gloominess. I would think his problem might be depression, but that's pretty much a woman's illness, isn't it?

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, depression is a major public health problem affecting an estimated six million men each year. Research studies have found that depression affects twice as many women as men. However, the studies also reveal that women and men may talk differently, or in the case of men, not talk about the symptoms of depression.

Men may not recognize their irritability, sleep problems, loss of interest in work or hobbies, and withdrawal as signs of depression. Therefore, fewer men may recognize their depression and ask for help.

Instead of acknowledging their feelings, asking for help, or seeking appropriate treatment, men with depression may be more likely to turn to alcohol or drugs, or to become frustrated, discouraged, angry or irritable.
