

Western National Tourney Colby girls are 1-1 in bracket action

Reds get late-inning victory over Rockies

CINCINNATI (AP) - All-Star gone. Gabe White, Jose Guillen and Scott Williamson have been shipped out, too.

The only thing left in the Cincinnati Reds' clubhouse is the positive late-inning karma.

The dismembered team finished another tearful day with another late-inning victory as Jason LaRue's 10th-inning homer beat the Colorado Rockies 5-4 Thursday night, temporarily easing some up Tuesday or Wednesday and pain.

"Anytime you get a last-inning victory, that's one of the best adrenalin rushes you can get," said LaRue, who hit his career-high 13th homer off Brian Fuentes (2-1).

They've had more such rushes than anyone else.

During the early months of their inaugural season at Great American Ball Park, the Reds managed to overcome the NL's worst pitching and the major leagues' worst defense with dramatic hits.

Between April 11 and June 17, third baseman Aaron Boone is they had nine game-ending hits. The drama dried up, the losses piled up, and the organization tore up its blueprint by firing the general manager and manager and dumping players.

As the tension mounted, the late wins returned. They've gone 3-1 since Monday, with all three wins coming in the 10th inning. They've had 12 game-ending hits overall and 25 wins in their last at-bat, the most in the majors.

It's about the only way they can win — they have only 49 victories this season.

"I would think the formula they used in all of those walk-off wins was the formula tonight," interim manager Dave Miley said.

White Sox trail Royals

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) The Chicago White Sox are still in second place, only they're a lot closer to first than they were a short time ago.

The White Sox, who were seven games back of first-place Kansas City at the All-Star break, cut Kansas City's lead in the AL Central to one game by completing a threegame sweep of the Royals with an 8-6, 11-inning victory Thursday night.

First baseman Paul Konerko played it cool after Chicago completed its first sweep in Kansas City since 1991.

"It's nice to get a sweep of the team that's leading the division," said Konerko, who hit a grand slam in Wednesday's 15-4 win and a tworun homer on Thursday.

"But nobody won the division with this series and nobody lost the division with this series. There's still a lot of baseball left."

Royals manager Tony Pena, whose team has gone 6-8 since the break and has lost seven of 10, also tried to keep the race in perspective.

"Our ballclub is going to be back," said Pena, whose team opens a three-game series Friday night against Tampa Bay — the last-place team in the AL East.

"We're still in first place. They're still chasing us."

The White Sox, meanwhile, travel to Seattle for a series against the AL West-leading Mariners.

"We've played well against Seattle," manager Jerry Manuel said. "If we get some more guys to step up for us, I think we can continue to do well."

On Thursday, it was Sandy Alomar's turn to step up — even though he wasn't expecting to.

When Manuel called for Brian Daubach to pinch hit in the 11th inning, Alomar figured he could duck away to the restroom.


Then the Royals brought in lefthander Graeme Lloyd to replace Nate Field (1-1), and Manuel called for Alomar instead.











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
