### Another four cases of West Nile confirmed

WICHITA(AP)—A25-year-old Thomas County resident is one of four new cases of West Nile virus confirmed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, the department said Tuesday.

The new cases bring to 14 the total number of West Nile virus meningitis or encephalitis infections in the state this year.

"It's within the range that we expected," said department spokeswoman Karen Watson.

The agency had expected a spike in the number of severe cases in August and September, then a drop off in October with the change of

All the latest victims have been hospitalized. The others are an 11year-old in Barton County, a 57year-old in Seward County and a 49-year-old in Sedgwick County. No further details were released by

But in the Wichita-area case, the Sedgwick County Health Department said the patient was first hospitalized with signs of the virus on Aug. 8 and was still in the hospital and recovering. It also said that due to the patient's travel outside of Kansas, it was possible the infection occurred elsewhere.

Symptoms of the virus are usually mild and include a headache, low-grade fever and muscle aches. It is rare for the virus to result in serious illness, and about 80 percent of those who contract the virus never know it.

TOPEKA (AP) — You've got of the state's \$10 billion budget mail — from the governor.

As of Tuesday, state employees began receiving an electronic newsletter from their boss, Gov. state's chief executive to improve

 $Sebelius' \, 'E-News' \, will \, be \, sent to \,$ all state employees with e-mail accounts, as well as residents who subscribe to the newsletter through the governor's official Web site. Sebelius said the newsletter is a response to requests statewide to be better informed about her activities.

"We have great things happening around the state and this 'E-News' will enable us to share some highlights that I am able to be part of," the governor said.

The first edition included photographs and short news items from Sebelius' visit to a General Motors plant where she picked up a new Chevrolet Malibu and the dedication of the Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics at the University of Kan-

Sebelius also mentioned in the newsletter progress of her Budget Efficiency Savings Team process,

since January.

The initial newsletter had a few glitches. Of the 10,013 newsletters sent, many were returned because Kathleen Sebelius, an effort of the of security programs in the state's e-mail system. Not everyone was enthusiastic about the new service. House Speaker Doug Mays, R-

Topeka, said he found it ironic that the governor was sending out thousands of unsolicited e-mails at a time when federal officials are looking to eliminate so-called spam messages.

"I think we're going to see a little loss of productivity," Mays said.

Nicole Corcoran, the governor's spokeswoman, said she had received telephone calls from emwhich she claims has identified ployees Tuesday who were "exmore than \$60 million savings out cited" to hear what is happening.

# Brownback pushing coal, nuclear power

passed by Congress, will likely include provisions to boost ethanol production, increase wind and other renewable energy sources, as well spur the nuclear energy industry.

"I am hopeful we are going to start sending the first signs of rejuvenating the nuclear energy industry," Brownback said. "We haven't built a nuclear plant for 30 years. It doesn't emit (carbon dioxide), which is a major problem, and it helps with the (electric) baseload."

The Kansas Republican made the comments at a Wichita Chamber of response to a question about a national energy policy.

Charles Benjamin, an attorney for the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club, said Brownback should be looking for ways to encourage wind power in Kansas instead of promoting coal and nuclear power plants. sources such as wind power.
