Many students were already well into the novel when Superintendent Jim White ordered copies of the book seized from the orientation class taught by Joyce Tallman after two complaints from parents. White's decision, without input

from the school board, drew almost immediate criticism. "It's a case where one or two par-

ents are forcing their personal beliefs on all students in the district, and that's wrong," said board member Stacy Cohen, who wants White to reverse his decision.

White said that after reading parts of the 1991 book it was clear to him it was not fit for his own daughter or granddaughter, so he ordered the book pulled. He said the book would remain in the high school library, but could not be used for the
