

School receives forensic science grant

Colby Public Schools received a \$1,500 grant from the Thomas County Community Foundation for their Forensic Traveling Labs high tech project, "Don't Do the Crime if You Can't Do the Time— or CSI Files: Is it the Truth?"

The foremost goal of the project is to empower students to be well-informed decision makers.

The second goal of the traveling forensic lab is to educate our students how high-tech crime labs use sophisticated technology to help police grant one step ahead of the criminals. In the various modules purchased from the grant monies, our students will learn about the history, development applications and tools used in the investigation of crimes. They will complete experiments to learn crime lab methods and how to effectively process a crime scene.

Goals for the project for grades 7-12 are: students will improve problem-solving and academic performance through scientific analysis and application for forensic science and technology; students will develop cooperative learning skills, leadership skills and presentation skills that are needed to work effectively in a changing technological society; students will participate in hands-on activities that incorporate science, technology and effective interpersonal skills; students will

increase their awareness and problem solving skills dealing with illicit drugs and of their consequences; and students will increase their awareness of career opportunities that exist in the various fields of science, criminology, justice system, technology, etc.
